

We have received an email containing a copy of an article in "Airburst" – the official E-letter of the Royal Australian Artillery Historical Company.

MARCH OFF 104TH FIELD BATTERY

To the nostalgic tune of "Auld Lang Syne", the 104th Field Battery drove off the 1st Field Regiment RAA parade into suspended animation on Saturday afternoon, 2 July 2004.

The post Second World War version of the 104th was raised on 1 September 1965 as a medium battery during the expansion of the RAA for the Vietnam War. When the 107th Field Battery left 12th Field Regiment RAA for service in Malaysia, 104th replaced it in a field role on 1 April 1967. It deployed to Vietnam with this unit in May 1968 for 12 months in direct support of 4RAR/NZ. It returned for a second tour in 1971 again as the direct support battery for 4RAR/NZ. The 104th returned to Australia in December and was the last RAA unit to serve in the Vietnam War.

When the 8th and 12th Regiments amalgamated in November 1973, 104th Field Battery went into suspended animation. Re-raised in November 1977 as part of the 8th/12th, it acted as an infantry company in the Army force which secured Bowral (between Sydney and Canberra) for the Commonwealth Heads of State Conference following the bomb blast at the Sydney Hilton Hotel in February 1978. The Battery again went into suspended animation on 11 June 1979. When the Army Reserve Integration became the flavor of the time in mid 1980s, the 104th emerged once again as an Army Reserve sub-unit of 1st Field Regiment RAA at

Enoggera. It became part of the Ready Reserve Scheme in 1997 until that was also terminated in 2000. From that time it has remained at Enoggera with progressively decreasing numbers.

An establishment review of the 1st Field Regiment last year amalgamated it with 13th Field Battery and at the RAA Regimental Conference in October 2004, it was agreed that the combined sub unit would be known as the 13th Field Battery primarily because this was the last remaining element of the once proud 5th Australian Field Artillery Brigade and later 5th Field Regiment RAA which had its home in south-east Queensland since 1921 (apart from its suspended animation 1946-54)

The "Germs" as they proudly call themselves, were once more removed from the Army's Order of Battle on 2 July 2005.

PHOENIX RISING

Phil and Glen Johnston's News: -

Hope this finds all the arty boys and their families well and happy.

Having just spent a month baby sitting two of our grandchildren in Singapore, thought I would share some thoughts of Singers.

On every trip through Changi airport I am reminded of the bulk of 104 battery 'boys' touching down there on our way to Vietnam. I can also recall that we had to pack and change to a white shirt on arrival so that we did not look like an army unit and maybe at that stage we did not. Possibly looked more like a Qantas choir from some future advertising campaign. The country, 'Singapore', continues to grow in size, not by aggressive military means but by re-claiming acreage from the sea. What was coastal front some 20 years ago is now near city centre. The whole containerized ship handling area is moving further around the coast. To buy a car here, which is a little more expensive than Australia you then need to add another 80 to 90 thousand dollars after rego as a tax or disincentive to driving on Singapore roads. That car will only have a life of 10 years and will be scrapped and you start the full process again and including paying another 80 to 90 grand once again. Fortunately trains and busses work a treat as you would expect. The non-tolerance of unsociable behaviour can have stiff penalties. Saw a couple of stories in the newspaper of licenses being cancelled for 8 years and one for 24 years. By that time we may not even have cars. Also saw the mention of caning for one fellow that was into thuggery and pimping. Do think that that will still be around in 24 years?

Now in Cambodia and working with our Australian Aid team (PVI). I offer the following for the interest to some and not to preach or self inflate. It uses up a bit more of Frank's available space as well.

We're a self funded mob of 100 or so members with nothing to sell, i.e. religion, politics or the light on the hill. Basically a fly-in, fly-out renovation team.

There are two jobs scheduled for this trip. The first, school near Sihanoukville with about 1000 kids per day, 6 days a week, 500 in the morning and 500 in the afternoon. It has one functioning squat toilet. A toilet block for boys and one for girls both blocked-up months ago due to no water tanks to either, to hand flush the pans. No maintenance at the school at all. Really smelly, deplorable conditions. Our fix to this health problem was to purchase and install a poly tank atop a concrete tower. We were then able to draw water from a nearby dam by means of a small pump and gravity feeding the water through 120 meters of poly pipe to tanks in each toilet block for hand ladle flushing. To use up the bulk of the 14 volunteers we have also washed down and painted two class rooms to brighten things up.

The second job is a school for handicapped kids at Chhuk near Kampot, where a kitchen with thatch sides and assorted tin 'bits' is being replaced with brick and metal roof, so a total rebuild. A concrete path to enable wheelchairs to move (where there was only dirt) and laying of 48 square meters of ceramic tiles on the classroom floor. This job is too remote to take a team into with regards accommodation, reliable food and cold beer so we are using local contractors and project managing the job. Lots of little things like language, customs and materials add to the fun of the job. There is no Bunnings here, but there is a tinker come blacksmith always around these towns.

I will try to insert a couple of snaps to give a better picture of the jobs. Frank I'm sure you will have the technical ability to adapt for the news letter. Phil, refer attached.

Looking forward to April 25 in Melbourne and sharing a glass or two with anyone who may be in town around that time.
