Hello to all,

Well I have finally finished that Honour Board that I have been doing for the Woomera Area School. The final number of veterans amounted to 2 Borneo/Malaya, 31 Vietnam, 1 Rwanda and 3 Iraq, not bad for a little school in the desert. Interestingly, fellow Germ Barry West and I are the only two Nashos.

I recently delivered the Honour Board to the School so it can be mounted for the unveiling on 11/11. It has been 35 years since I was last in Woomera. I must say I was really disappointed how Woomera has been let go. The place reminded me of Marysville after the bushfires last year. The Americans have all gone now and the place is more in caretaker mode, being kept alive for the various military exercises that go on from time to time. The small supermarket has most things. I would guess that the permanent population would be no more than a couple of hundred people tops. The 2 x 50 metre swimming pools have been replaced with a 25 metre pool with a 1 metre springboard. Also the 180km road to Port Augusta is all bitumen now and it's less than 2 hours drive away. Other countries use the facilities from time to time. I know the Japanese are using some of the infrastructure for their space projects. The super hornets were bombing out on the range when I was there.

Woomera was designated a hardship posting for the Americans when they were there. No TV, no McDonalds, KFC and the like with limited entertainment and other facilities. The yanks, they like it all served up to them. I'm sure the road would still be unsealed if it wasn't for them

Paula and I went back to Townsville for a 4 day reunion with a few of the people I worked with there last year. It was good to catch up again as we were all from different parts of Australia and were retained to do a difficult job at the time. The atmosphere was a bit more relaxed and we did not need any security guards this time around.

Last week Paula and I were in Tasmania to help daughter Nadia move into her new home in Blackmans Bay near Hobart. I have arms like a gorilla after all the lifting I did. We managed to spend a couple of days down at Bicheno were Nadia has a holiday house, mainly to bring things back to Hobart for the new house. Tassie is growing on me, it is a nice part of the world and so scenic where ever you go.

Yesterday (Wednesday) I had lunch with Rick Polley, Myles Charter and Peter Burls (102 Bty). I had not seen Myles or Peter in 40 years. Peter and I worked in the Commonwealth Bank so when we went into National Service, as Army pay was less than what the Bank pay was, the Bank as a generous employer made up the difference. In Peter and my case we did not access that money for the 2 years, so it was like a compulsory savings plan for us and a tidy little nest egg on discharge. I did not know it at the time but apparently it was a bone of contention for some of the other Nashos whose employers were not so generous. This issue has been festering for over 40 years and raised its ugly head again at lunch. There is a Germ who was a Butcher in Civy Street, who shall remain nameless but his initials are MC, that was paranoid about this fact and is still smarting.

Well that's me for the guarter. Sorry I am late out with the Germ Journal however, I had a busy September.

Barry and Sue West's News: -

July 2010.

Hi folks.

Let me update you on my treatment. I have just arrived back home againafter a week in hospital, having had to have an emergency admission last Monday night because of chronic back pain as a result of the tumor in my spine causing compression of the spinal chord. That resulted in a week of radiotherapy sessions and a plethora of blood tests, bone marrow biopsies and x-ray scans of my whole skeletal system and a visit from the haematology specialists. Firstly, let me say that I am definitely not pregnant. Sounds strange I know, but one of my chemo treatments (which commenced on July 1) will be a continuing high dose of Thalidomide, not good for developing foetuses, but apparently very effective against Multiple Myeloma, which I now have confirmation of. That will be used in combination with a steroid called dexmethasone and stem cell replacement therapy - whereby some of my new bone marrow, along with "good" stem cells will be extracted from me and frozen, then all of my red and white blood cells together with remaining stem cells are killed off with high dose chemo, leaving me with zero immunity for a period of time, at which I will need to be in semi-isolation in hospital while I am given a complete blood transfusion with my new clean stem cells which had been frozen. The treatment will be ongoing. Sounds a bit like science fiction, but apparently becoming a common treatment for cancer. There is no guarantee of 100% success, and in all probability, I will need to revisit the treatment whenever I have a relapse. But then the alternative offers even less. What that means of course is that I will necessarily become less involved in some activities I have enjoyed in the past, because I am going to have periods of lethargy form the chemo and sustained periods of semi-isolation both in and out of hospital, to avoid infection during the stem cell replacement therapy.

All sounds kind of hairy I know, but thankfully I have confidence in the medical team at The Canberra Hospital who are treating me and the support from our Department of Veterans Affairs has been excellent to date. In addition, the support I have had from my family and especially Susan, together with your support will make the task ahead that little easier. I thank you all.

August 2010.

Firstly, again thankyou all for your well wishes, cards, emails, phone calls and visits, they are all much appreciated by both myself and Susan.

Let me give you an update on me. Firstly, let me say that I have already mentioned that my condition is incurable, so I may as well mention here that even with treatment, my life expectancy is likely to be of the order of 3 to 5 years at best, so you can see Susan and I have a lot to do in the next few years. Well the last month or six weeks has been very up and down for me. Many trips to the hospital for more scans, blood tests and radiotherapy on both my arm and my back. Unfortunately, my mobility is still not good, but improving slowly. The continuing high doses of radiation and the various drugs are taking their toll on my poor old body though and I have lost nearly 20 kg in weight - a mere shadow of my former self. Anyway, I'll continue to battle on until him Big Fella in the sky decides it's time for me to join him I guess. What more can I do? In the meantime, Susan and I will continue to plod through reams of paperwork, tax files etc to get things in some sort of order. I'm hoping for a review with the Haematologist in a few weeks and we should get some idea of how the current thalidomide treatment is working, so I will finish here for now and maybe report back in a few weeks time after that review.

September 2010.

Had my first review with the Haematologist yesterday (Monday). The news is encouraging in that my M-protein levels (ie the bad protein related to the myeloma cancer) have responded well to the current Thalidomide/steroid treatment and have dropped from 20 to 4. They will never drop to zero, but the result so far is very encouraging. The plan now is to continue at present on the same drug regime, with another review scheduled for November. My fingers and toes will remain crossed. In the meantime, I still have some work to do with physio on my right arm and right foot/leg (which is suffering "foot drop" probably as a result of the radiation treatment I have had to the base of my spine). Hopefully I will be able to regain much of my mobility. For those who last saw me some weeks ago, you will be pleased to note that a change in my pain medication has eliminated my constant nausea, I am eating much better now and I have regained some of the weight I had lost (I was 97kg when I went into hospital in June, and a little over a month ago I was down to 77kg. I am now back to 86kg).
